Regardless of where in this country a person lives, regardless of race or occupation, everyone has been affected by the recession. It can become easy to fall into the trap of feeling helpless and unable to contribute to anyone or any cause outside our own family. I encourage every person to consider what we have and not dwell on the losses of 2008.

On November 23, 2008, Leatherwood pastor, Mike Owens, delivered a message on stewardship that I found to be profound. Two quotes have become part of who I am:

We make a living by what we get....We make a life by what we give.

Some people know the price of everythingand the value of nothing.

When we consider what we contribute, let us not forget the value of our time, our creative abilities, our people skills. So many people need to have someone send a card, make a telephone call or cook a meal.

The best way for a person who is just trying to find their way back into life, after a period of surgeries and treatments, is to help and encourage someone, caught like a deer in the headlights, not knowing which way to turn.

A few months ago, my brother, Gerald, a widower, and his friend, Bruce, who had recently lost his wife, came to visit. Gerald brought a movie, "The Bucket List." I thought it would be morbid because it is about two men who have both been diagnosed with terminal cancer. Even though the subject matter is certainly anything but funny, the characters, brought to life the lyrics of the song, "I Hope You Get the Chance to Live Like You Are Dying." They had adventures that left us in tears because of laughter.

An email that I've received several times, closes with, "Be nice to everyone you meet, everyone you meet is dealing with something." When I read the following poem, I thought about that statement:

- 1. Symptoms?
- 2. How is it diagnosed?
- 3. Are there any new treatments for IBC? Is there a recommended treatment for IBC?
- 4. In young women, where the breast looks inflamed, do doctors test for IBC before starting an antibiotic treatment?
- 5. How much time does a patient have before diagnosis, to give the best chance of survival?
- 6. Please feel free to add information that these questions do not address.

Great Question!

Inflammatory breast cancer is a (fortunately) rare and aggressive variant carcinoma that makes up 1-4% of all breast cancer cases. It occurs when cancer cells invade the lymphatic channels of the skin, causing them to be congested. The result is a red, swollen, warm breast with a characteristic "peau d' orange" effect. That is, the edema makes the skin appear like the skin of an orange—thickened and pitted. Sadly, this quick-acting form of cancer is often misdiagnosed as an infection and treated as such for too long. Although it is acceptable to treat with antibiotics for a few days, the astute clinician should recognize that if the "infection" is not clearing up, it is time to consider the diagnosis of inflammatory breast cancer. A matter of weeks can make the difference between a treatable condition and a lethal one.

Diagnosis of inflammatory breast cancer is made by performing a punch biopsy of the affected skin. The pathologist will be able to see cancer cells within the dermal lymphatics. Then, there should be an investigation into how far the cancer has spread, using mammogram, bone scan and CT scans. Simply having a diagnosis of inflammatory breast cancer is Stage IIIb (locally advanced), and if the cancer has invaded other organs, it is Stage IV. Prognosis is especially poor for inflammatory breast cancer. Five year survival rates range from 25-50%.

Treatment of this form of cancer is aggressive and begins with neoadjuvant (before surgery) chemotherapy (usually Adriamycin/Cytoxan and Taxol) and hormonal therapy with tamoxifen and herceptin is appropriate. After that, the patient undergoes modified radical mastectomy, followed by more chemotherapy and radiation to the chest wall. There is no consideration given to breast conservation therapy or reconstruction.

Research in this area is focused on chemotherapeutic options, some improvement has been seen with very high dose chemotherapy regimens. This requires a bone marrow transplant after therapy, as the medication is so strong that it destroys the bone marrow. Also, some important strides are being made in the area of targeted therapy. That means profiling the genetics peculiar to an individual cancer cell line and creating the most lethal cocktail of drugs to attack it.
