Complex Diagnosis

Not Just One Disease

Breast cancer is not just one disease. There are several types of breast cancer and the patient's prognosis depends on what type she has.

So let's look at different breast cancer types:

1. Most breast cancers-about 85% are infiltrating ductal (ductal). The second most common is lobular. There are several distinctly uncommon types such as tubular or mucinous.

2. A cancer may be either in situ (in place) or invasive. DCIS (ductal carcinoma in situ) has not invaded any surrounding tissues and so has not traveled. But, it needs to be removed because if it is not, it will progress to invasive cancer. Ductal carcinoma in situ (DCIS) may be unifocal (one spot or multifocal (several spots). Invasive cancer has spread into surrounding tissue and may have also traveled to lymph nodes or more distant spots.

3. All breast cancers are tested for 3 markers. They are ER (estrogen receptor), PR (progesterone receptor) and HER-2 –neu. A tumor may have more than one combination of these markers-prognosis and treatment depend on markers. A tumor which is ER positive and PR positive "likes" estrogen. Receptor values vary from 0 to 3. Zero means "I don't care" if there is estrogen or not, #1 means "I only care a little," # 2 "I care a lot," #3 "I really love estrogen and will really be injured if I don't have it." Depriving the tumor of estrogen will be an important part of treatment. HER-2-neu

is a protein found on the surface of 1 in 5 breast cancers. This protein gives the cancer cell growth advantage. This type of breast cancer is particularly aggressive; however, if herceptin is used in the adjuvant setting, long term survival is 90%.

4. Ki67. A high Ki67 says that the cancer grows quickly, a low one that it grows slowly.

5. Gene Testing. There are several tests that may help your doctor decide whether or not you need chemotherapy. The most widely used is the Oncotype Dx. In this test, the pathologist sends the cancer to be tested for 21 genes and a recurrence score is given. This test only works for tumors which are ER + Her 2 Neu negative. Also, it has only been validated (proven to be useful) for node negative tumors. A high score indicates that you need chemotherapy; a low score means you may not.

Be sure you seek the advice of a medical oncologist before making a treatment decision.

know the names of all the different kinds of breast cancer, or the complexities of each diagnosis. I did learn that there is no blanket answer to even one question. Doctors at Anniston Oncology have agreed to answer each question submitted to Lenora Johnson. We are grateful to Dr. Spremulli, Dr. Vadlamani and Dr. Beard for their willingness to work with Steel Magnolias. As questions are answered, information provided will be published in the Steel Magnolias Newsletter. A surprising number of Steel Magnolias have been diagnosed with triple negative breast cancer. I can remember only two women, familiar to Steel Magnolias, who were diagnosed with very rare breast cancer. One was diagnosed with phantom breast cancer—(mystery cancer, breast cancer found in a location other than the breast;) the other with inflammatory breast cancer-(cancer that originates on the outside of the breast and is often confused with breast infection). I am interested in learning more about these two cancers.




