Uncle Pete and Aunt Inez had a little café near the shed. Sometimes I cooked and waited tables. One year Bobby was among the young men. He was a 23 year old man from Mississippi, tall, dark and handsome, a relative of Elvis Presley. At fifteen and a devoted Elvis fan, I was in love—or so I thought. Needless to say my parents were beside themselves. When the season was over, Bobby went

back to Mississippi and left me with a broken heart.


In the October issue of Reader's Digest, I recently read a beautiful letter. It is sentiment every woman will appreciate.
