Survivor of the Month

In 2003, Keither Ziemet had a mammogram as regularly scheduled since her late 30's. This time, the review indicated some abnormalities. She was sent to RMC for a second mammogram, which revealed a lump in one breast. RMC doctors performed a biopsy, which did show the cells to be malignant. A lumpectomy was immediately performed, followed by six weeks of radiation treatment.

Keither was able to tolerate the treatments and continue to work as a hairstylist, a profession she has enjoyed for more than 40 years. The wife of a teacher and retired military historian, she also has a daughter.

Today, Keither is cancer free. She attributes her good health to the treatment plan and highly commends RMC staff.

"Everyone was so nice, kind and understanding during the whole situation. The nurses and techs made the treatment time actually seem to go by very fast." she says.

As part of her personal commitment to fighting cancer, Keither is using her professional talents to help make wigs and style hair for cancer victims. In addition, she is active in the volunteer support group "Steel Magnolias", that works to raise money to help area cancer victims.
